

Music

The B.S. in Music allows students to develop their artistic voice through a flexible curriculum that emphasizes musicianship and creativity. Our program is individualized, allowing us to work closely with students to develop a plan of studies that fulfills their academic and musical interests. The B.S. in Music student can choose between 17 and 19 credits of elective classes. Students create their own academic path in consultation with their advisor. Elective courses in music allow students to further develop skills in music technology, composition or performance. B.S. in Music students may also choose to take elective courses in another discipline, allowing them to pursue a second major or a minor in any of the disciplines within the School of Arts and Sciences. In their senior year, students in the B.S. Music program develop a Capstone Project meant to show their skills as musicians. The Capstone Project may take the form of a lecture recital, a portfolio of original works or a recording project. Students work in collaboration with their advisor in designing a project that is artistically meaningful and personal in nature. Students wishing to develop skills in music creation can enroll for applied composition lessons, where they work with their instructors in developing projects that suit their needs. These may take the shape of written compositions or works based on digital technology.

Essential Skills:

Essential skills refer to the knowledge gained from a liberal arts education. They provide a framework to guide students' progress toward their degree, but also prepare students for a broad range of career paths. A recent survey from the Association of American Colleges and Universities (AAC&U) shows employers "strongly agree" that "regardless of a student's field of study" liberal arts skills best prepare students to enter the job market in their career of choice.

- 1. Critical and Creative Thinking:
 - a. Make decisions and solve problems using sound, inclusive reasoning and judgment.
 - b. Combine/synthesize concepts in original ways; think/work in imaginative ways involving innovation, divergent thinking, risk taking.
- 2. Written and Oral Communication:
 - a. Understand the importance of and demonstrate verbal, written, and non-verbal/body language, abilities.
 - b. Communicate in a clear and organized manner so that others can effectively understand.
- 3. Information Literacy:
 - a. Gather and analyze information from a diverse set of sources and individuals to fully understand a problem.
 - b. Manipulate information, construct ideas, and use technology to achieve specific goals.
- 4. Inquiry and Analysis:
 - a. Accurately summarize and interpret information with an awareness of personal biases that may impact outcomes.
 - b. Identify and evaluate appropriate resources for completing musical and pedagogical tasks.
- 5. Problem Solving:
 - a. Design, evaluate, implement a strategy to answer an open-ended question or achieve a desired goal.
