



**Music Therapy: B.S.**

The B.S. in Music Therapy provides students with the necessary theoretical knowledge, practical techniques and clinical experience required to use music as a therapeutic modality with children and adults who have special needs. The program is interdisciplinary and incorporates both music coursework to develop students' musicianship skills, and coursework in Psychology provides models for evaluations and treatment of clinical populations. Courses in Music Therapy include the theoretical basis for music as therapy and music in therapy, exploration of clinical techniques and models, training in clinical improvisation, music therapy lab experiences and fieldwork experiences at clinical sites on Long Island and the Metropolitan area. The culminating experience of the student's training is a 900-hour clinical internship completed in the senior year.

**Essential Skills:**

Essential skills refer to the knowledge gained from a liberal arts education. They provide a framework to guide students' progress toward their degree, but also prepare students for a broad range of career paths. A recent survey from the Association of American Colleges and Universities (AAC&U) shows employers "strongly agree" that "regardless of a student's field of study" liberal arts skills best prepare students to enter the job market in their career of choice.

1. Critical and Creative Thinking:
  - a. Make decisions and solve problems using sound, inclusive reasoning and judgment.
  - b. Combine/synthesize concepts in original ways; think/work in imaginative ways involving innovation, divergent thinking, risk taking.
2. Written and Oral Communication:
  - a. Understand the importance of and demonstrate verbal, written, and non-verbal/body language, abilities.
  - b. Communicate in a clear and organized manner so that others can effectively understand.
3. Information Literacy:
  - a. Gather and analyze information from a diverse set of sources and individuals to fully understand a problem.
  - b. Manipulate information, construct ideas, and use technology to achieve specific goals.
4. Inquiry and Analysis:
  - a. Accurately summarize and interpret information with an awareness of personal biases that may impact outcomes.
  - b. Identify and evaluate appropriate resources for completing musical and pedagogical tasks.
5. Problem Solving:
  - a. Design, evaluate, implement a strategy to answer an open-ended question or achieve a desired goal.
