## **COURSE NUMBERING:**

200-299 Intermediate level studies normally on the sophomore level. Courses may require pre-requisites on the 100-level. Course assignments require or reinforce speaking, writing, and critical thinking skills of a level above basic competency.

**300-399** Advanced level studies normally on the junior or senior level, taken especially by majors in the

departments offering the courses. Courses may require pre- or co- requisites. Course assignments require and reinforce mature speaking, writing, and

critical thinking skills.

Students are held to a high level of initiative and responsibility.

**390-399** Selected Topics: in-depth study of topics not included in detail

in the regular curriculum cycle.

**400-499** Specialized studies, senior seminars, and capstone courses
